6. Confirmation of the Minutes from the Previous meeting: 22 August 2013

Corrections:

Page 5 under point 13, 3rd paragraph: He said that these projects were operational matters

With the above correction, the minutes were confirmed as a true record, proposed by Mr N Rubushe and seconded by Mr M Macanda and Mr A Mbilini.

7. Approval of the audited Annual Financial Statements 30 April 2013.

Ms Esther Rodze presented the financials as at end of the financial year.

- 7.1 Our auditors are still PwC and will start on page 5.
- 7.2 The business can operate for the foreseeable future.
- 7.3 Statement of financial position: comparison with 2013 and 2014.
Starting with assets, the non-currents had dropped.
- 7.4 Property Plan & Equipment had decreased from R 4.9 to 4.2 million due to depreciation.
- 7.5 Associate in CEC, R 1 089 000 to R 100 000.00.
- 7.6 Deferred income tax increased, due to incurring the loss, R 2.9 million to R 3.7 million.
- 7.7 Interest received, was the loan from employee R Booie.
- 7.8 Current assets were reduced, inventories were reduced, as it reduced our risk.
- 7.9 Other financial assets. R 1.3 million in Standard Bank. When it matured in May 2014, the amount moved to Cash and Cash equivalents. Re-invested R 1 million and the balance in operations.
- 7.10 Interest bearing receivables went up from R 15 000 to R 60 000.
- 7.11 Total assets went down from R 12 million to R 9 million.
- 7.12 Equity and liabilities. Retaining income reduced from R 7 to R 4.5 million (because of the loss)
- 7.13 Non-current liabilities. Now zero, as we no longer owe Budget Rent a Car.
- 7.14 Trade and other payables (Debtors), R 2.9 million to R 2.3 million
- 7.15 Deferred income, moved from R 1.1 million to R 1 million, with the bank balance overdraft increasing.
- 7.16 Statement of comprehensive income on page 6 – summary of income.
- 7.17 Revenue decreased from R 16 million to R 14 million.
Prior year we received a grant from CSA to retain the stadium.
- 7.18 Cost of sales went up from R 1.2 million to R 1.4 million (hospitality)
- 7.19 Gross surplus from R 14 million to R 13 million. There was no other income.
- 7.20 Operating expenses went from R 17 million to R 15 million.
- 7.21 Deficit was R 2.7 million
- 7.22 We have an investment in CEC and share with EP.
We share 50 % of loss and incurred R 998 000 in a loss, based on 50% share of loss with CEC.
- 7.23 Finance costs (bank charges) R 221 000, due to increase in overdraft facility
- 7.24 Taxation went down to R 766 000.
- 7.25 Total deficit of R 2.6 million up from R 1.6 million from last year
- 7.26 Page 7. Statement in equity, shows balances over 3 years. From 2012, we had R8.8 million and now at R 4.5 million with losses over last 3 years.
- 7.27 Page 8 – statement of cash flows. Our net cash from operating activities went up to R 1.5 million.
We paid out more this year of R 17.2 million from R 16 million.
- 7.28 Cash from investing activities went up to R 1.8 million, disposal of investment.
- 7.29 R 575 000 dividends received, stadium usage from CEC.
- 7.30 Finance and activities, decrease in interest bearing loan (R 176 000) loan by employee
- 7.31 Takes us to a net increase in cash of R 272 000. R 1.3 million down from R 1.8 million.
- 7.32 Page 9 onwards provided more detail of what had already been explained.
- 7.33 ER highlighted that Border Cricket was still a going concern and we have other plans in place to reduce our loss going forward, however the loss this year was unexpected with R998 000 contributed by CEC

Comments and questions from the Members:

- 7.34 Mr Rubushe asked about the R 1 million investment from Standard Bank. ER replied that this investment matured and was moved it to FNB, it was now security as an overdraft with the bank. We can not touch it as this stage because of the overdraft that we have with the bank.
- 7.35 Mr Makhasi, queried page 8, the cash paid to suppliers. He said that employees were receiving a larger share of money than was spent on cricket. He asked if it could not be shown by separating as to which items absorbed most of the money - suppliers or employees? ER said that they should refer to the summary on page 21. According to the CSA Presidential plan, we need to have certain staff positions, so we are currently understaffed with certain staff having double roles. We do not pay overtime.
- 7.36 Ms Dickmolo said that Border used to have a bus and then it was sold. She asked if it was not worth it to buy another bus. ER replied that it was costly to buy a new bus in the new financial year. We sold it for R 131 000 but a new bus is R 500 000 but in the long term, it would be a saving to have your own vehicle. TB said that CSA had busses and we receive 5 free trips for the entire year. Busses should also be able to generate income and we could not afford for the bus to sit still in the off season. CSA were looking at busses, and when CSA busses were not used for cricket, they were used for tourists. We will continue to look at the best viable option but were also waiting on CSA for more feedback.
- 7.37 Mr Rubushe asked if the reason for the loss in CEC was due to less fixtures played. ER said that the loss was not directly linked to matches but was operational. Fixtures were rotated as per the Shareholders agreement. TB said Warriors had not been to the Champions' league for the past few seasons which was a major money spinner. CEC were having some challenges and EP was providing some services to CEC. There is a new Board at CEC and CSA have asked them to get their house in order. CEC signed a declaration with CSA. There are other franchises that are running at a loss and CSA had agreed to cover flights and accommodation for the franchise competitions. We need to break even and start generating profits and to provide monthly updates. If we do not comply, we will have to explain or be penalized, or face disciplinary actions. We will also be revisiting the shareholders agreements as we need to make changes going forward.
- 7.38 Academy weeks were included in the various provincial weeks.
- 7.39 TG said that CEC had been trading recklessly and had made a huge loss and highlighted leadership challenges. The CEO of Border is acting as CEO for CEC. The team needs to win trophies and declare profits. EP was managing the CEC finances and who were failing them. John Ross-Smith from East London was the current Interim Chairman.

The financials were approved by Mr Rubushe and Mr Macanda

8. Report from the President

The report had been distributed to the members prior to the meeting and was included in the pack. He mentioned the Directors and advised that we still need to replace Mr Daylan Staude as Chairman of Audit and a Non-Independent director still needed to be appointed.

Members are supposed to pay a 100 Affiliation fee and not many members had paid this. Not many members submitted their reports as per our MOI.

Regions should be advising the office of their AGMs so that the leadership of BC can attend such meetings.

CSA stipulates that there should be two Black African players on the field but four players of colour.

We have until the end of September to comply with CSA's MOI.

The funding model would not be favourable to us although other unions would be worse off than us. This would be tabled at the CSA AGM in September on 13 Sep

CSA would be visiting provinces to see how to restructure.

a) MOI for CSA were still looking at the tenure of the Directors and how to stagger them.

Alternate Directors was also something that would be looked at.

b) SASCO and their power was mentioned

c) Demarcations were still a topic of discussion at CSA.

d) Amending the dispute resolution would form part of the revised MOI

He thanked the Members for their contribution to cricket and encouraged them to work together and lead Border Cricket favourably without squabbling but sitting together around a table to iron out issues.

Before CSA comes to Border, we will call a Special meeting with Members to discuss the demarcation and will

not be making any submissions to the Steering committee before we have all met.

9. Amendments to the MOI

Mr Mike Smith presented the amendments which had been suggested by Cricket SA to align to. He highlighted the changes, which were mainly to include the following:

- Include the Associates
- The Board to be expanded with emphasis of having Independent directors
- Add a Dispute resolution

Mr Smith highlighted the inclusions and amendments via a powerpoint presentation. There were no objections to the changes and these were duly accepted by the Members, as proposed.

10. Election of Office Bearers

a) Treasurer

Members were asked to submit nominations for this position but none had been received.

The meeting agreed to give the members twenty-one days to nominate a Treasurer and someone to lead Transformation. Should the Members fail to deliver, the Board would make the appointment and report back to the Members.

11. Confirmation of the Directors

c) Election of One Independent Director (to replace the Chairman of Audit)

The Directors would bring the name of the candidate for the Audit committee to the Members.

The Complete list of Directors is:

Non-Independent Directors; T Ganda, S Ndzundzu, S Ngcaba and J Naidoo (still need 1 other)

Independent Directors: Lizelle Maurice, Dr Dweba, need 1 on Audit Co and would recommend re-appointing Mike Smith as the 4th Independent Director for continuation. The Members agreed to re-appoint Mr Smith for another term.

12. Confirmation of the Auditors

PWC was appointed last year (2013) for three years so they were still the auditors.

13. Date of next AGM meeting: 27 August 2015

14. Closure and Prayer

Mr Ganda thanked everyone for giving up their time for Border Cricket and appealed to Members to continue to serve cricket in the best interests of the game. He asked members to keep informing the Board of what was happening in their regions and to invite the Directors to their meetings. Members should go out to the regions and inform them of what was discussed at the AGM as they represent the people.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

TANDO GANDA

Introduction

This report reflects on the period September 2014 until June 2015. I thought that we need to reflect on our company in the passing year guided by the priorities of the Department of Sports Recreation; Arts and Culture. DSRC priorities have been created out of the National Sports and Recreation Plan which comes directly from the National Developmental Plan. So we must check whether our objectives and operations are in line with the mandate of government. However; this is not trying to overlook or undermine the mandate as set in the Presidential Plan of Cricket South Africa and the strategic plans of CSA and our strategic plan. This report will be focusing on the following points: structures; facilities; tournaments and festivals; recreational programmes; schools sport (cricket); academies

Structures

Border Cricket

The board is aligned to CSA in terms of founding documents and the composition of the board itself. We are continuously looking for people especially independent persons to serve as directors of the company. We always have vacancies because the kinds of people or skills we need are scarce or hard to get. We managed to get people for various positions in the board but they serve two or three years and resign for personal reasons. However; the board remains fully operational and productive

Member Structures

Border cricket has got member structures which are also known as shareholder. The shareholders constitute members council according to our MOI. Each structure is represented by one person in the council. It is very much concerning, the fact that there is no feedback from the representatives about what is happening in the various structures. East London East is doing well and the structure has been inviting the president in their meetings and activities. We managed to address serious concerns from clubs of East London West hence the new leadership. Middledrift; Alice and Healdtown are doing fairly well as sub unions or member structures. King William's town and Queenstown remain our serious concern as we cannot confidently say the structure is operational. Our associate structures are not performing to an acceptable level with the exception of scorers and umpires. We need to mirror CSA regarding the performance of these structures i.e. rewarding best performances and penalize poor performance.

Facilities

Buffalo City fields

We make use of them though we need to improve on communication about them amongst ourselves. Serious allegations were raised by East London West and to avoid confusion and conflicts; we must just keep on with our positive attitudes and continuous engagements amongst ourselves.

Lotto Project

The recipients of funding for the facilities and equipment from the Lottery Funding are still waiting for service delivery. Also; Lotto is still waiting for a report that says we delivered according to the contract we signed with them. We definitely have to complete the outstanding work gradually as the resources are no longer there.

Rural Major Facilities

We have facilities in Middledrift; Alice (NCG) and Ngumbela Park. These facilities need our undivided attention if we are serious about transformation and Africanization of our cricket.

Concrete Pitches in the villages

These facilities must be continuously monitored and maintained. These pitches are the breeding places of our black African cricket and they serve both clubs and schools in the outskirts.

Tournaments and Festivals

National Tournaments and Festivals

When we send our teams as Border Cricket to national tournaments and festivals; we must not compromise quality. Our teams must be fully prepared for the occasions so as to ensure transformation in this country.

Provincial programmes

We need to improve both quality and quantity on our provincial tournaments and festivals. We must partner with the various stakeholders in ensuring that we get the best out of these provincial programmes.

Regional programmes

The same can be said about our regional programmes. Our regional programmes must lead to participation at provincial programmes giving us a good opportunity to produce quality cricketers

Recreational Activities

Border Cricket does not have recreational cricketing activities especially for the aged citizens of the region. Such activities could ensure support for our main activities. Also; we can improve the life style our people through cricket.

Schools Cricket

There is no co-operation or working relationship between the Department of Education and the Department of Sport; Recreation; Arts and Culture. The poor working relations between the two departments resulted in nonexistent of working relationships between the Department of Education and sports federations. School sport in general does not get due support and attention from the Department of Education. Teachers are not taking sport serious as in the good olden days. Teachers have their own issues with the Department which affects sport negatively. Cricket structures in our various regions are not active and productive. Coaching in the various schools is at its lowest level. Border cricket must come up with strategies and techniques on improving coaching and management of cricket teams in our schools especially in the rural areas. We also need to come up with exciting programmes for our school going girls and boys to ensure improved participation in cricket.

Academies

We must be informed about what the academies of sports offer. For example; as Border Cricket; we have to know everything that happens at Fort Hare University. Also CSA now is now going to fund Academies.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

CEO's Annual Report

It is my great pleasure to present the CEO's report for the 2014/2015 season. Having been in the office for two years is both humbling and a great honour to lead such a dynamic team.

The past season has once again rendered some outstanding achievements and developments in a number of our cricketing structures. It is near impossible to highlight all these achievements in this brief report.

The season was truly a challenging one. Our Semi-Pro team performed exceptionally well by clinching the Momentum One day Cup. This is the second time Border has won this trophy in 3 years. The results from the Sunfoil 3-day and T20 challenges were disappointing, although we ended better and played winning Cricket towards the end of the season.

All three Rural Teams qualified for the CSA Rural week. This talks to the quality of our rural tournaments.

Papama Fojela was one of the nominees for the CSA Provincial Bowler of the Year which is a great achievement. Mkhululi Calana won the CSA Rural Cricketer of the year award. We would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge Ian Howell who has decided to retire from umpiring. This concludes 36 years of his playing and umpiring career, and for this milestone we congratulate him and thank him for his immense contribution to cricket.

Congratulations to Shephard Ngcaba, our Honourary Life Vice-President and former Chairman of Finance, who was awarded with the Khaya Majola Lifetime Achievement award which was presented to him at the recent Cricket SA Awards.

Constitutional Alignment

We have aligned our constitution with the MOI of Cricket South Africa. This will further strengthen our Board and improve good governance within the Organisation.

Financial Management

Our financial performance has been encouraging. We saw a 45% positive growth on our revenue. We also realised an operational profit for the first time in more than 4 years. We are embarking on a journey which will see a more income generating approach. My thanks and appreciation must go to the Finance Committee and Management team for all their efforts in achieving this goal.

Buffalo Park Hospitality

Our Hospitality Department continues to grow under tough economic conditions. The team has done well in ensuring that Buffalo Park is a preferred venue of choice in the region. We have seen an increase in the number of conferences and big Events. Their year on year growth was about 7%.

New Projects

We had new projects and developments that were launched during the period under review. These include:

- Pre Season Launch
- Border Cricket Providing Mentorship to Kei Cricket
- Border Cricket Golf Day – Fund Raising initiative
- Border Cricket Appointed as an Implementing Agent by the National Lotteries Board for the Development of a Multi Sports Centre in Tshabo

REVIEW OF THE SEASON

ROSS ROCHE

It ended on a high with them tasting silverware for the second time in three seasons when the Border semi-professional cricket team defeated Free State in the final of the Cricket South Africa (CSA) provincial 50-over challenge in Bloemfontein at the conclusion of the season.

After tasting their first success in the one day format in the 2012/2013 season against the same team in the same town, Bloemfontein will have become a very happy hunting ground for Border. It was a great end to a decent season that saw Border fall short of their goal in the longer format of the game but impressed in the shorter form again.

"We had a fairly good season," said Border coach Frank Plaatjes. "Winning more silverware was important for us as it proves we can compete with the best of them on the big stage." "But it wasn't outstanding by any means. We reached our goal to make a final but we wanted to do really well in the three day competition and by not doing great in the three day we fell well short of that goal," continued Plaatjes.

Once again it was the Border bowlers who were their shining light in all forms of the game. Strike bowlers Phaphama Fojela, Yanda Pangabantu, Thandolwethu Mnyaka and spinner Brandon Williams impressed throughout the season while all-rounders Jerry Nqolo, Gionne Koopman and Burton de Wett put in some top performances as well. "Our bowlers were first class this season," said Plaatjes.

However Border's batting, as has been the case in seasons past, seemed to do well in the shorter formats, but battled to deliver on the three day front. Young up-and-comers Marco Marais, Nqolo and Koopman enjoyed success at various stages in the season while the more experienced Martin Walters and De Wett also enjoyed some good moments. Walters ended the season having scored the highest score for Border (161) in the three day format and 104 for the one day side.

"Our batsmen once again couldn't put up the big totals, especially first innings totals and it is something we need to work on," said Plaatjes.

Border's Warriors regulars must not be forgotten and when they were available they put in some top performances. Somila Seyibokwe, Lundi Mbane, Darryl Brown and Aya Gqamane were all active starters for the Warriors at stages in the season, but put in some great shifts when back with Border.

Mbane was one of the stars of the one-day final win picking up 4/15 in 8.3 overs, while Gqamane with 6/30 against Easterns, Brown with 5/14 against Eastern Province and Seyibokwe with 101 against Western Province had their stand out moments in the season.

"Quite a few of our players were involved with the Warriors, which bodes well for Border Cricket and shows that we have the players who can make the step up," said Plaatjes.

Border will now look to evaluate their season and set new targets and goals for the next season.

The 2014/2015 cricket season commenced in September with the first ever Season launch, held on Saturday 20 September 2014. The day included all our sectors of cricket: KFC Mini-Cricket, U13's Club Cricket, Women's Cricket, High Schools, Border Provincial and Franchise (Warriors). Selborne College beat Dale College in a very exciting and nail-biting schools clash. In the final match of the day, a very motivated Border Semi-Pro team beat the Chevrolet Warriors. The event was a huge success and even though we did not have the number of spectators attending as we had hoped, it was day enjoyed by all. Thank you to our generous sponsors who included Airports Company, Zennith Installations, Coca-Cola and Algoa FM.



The Cricket events management function included both the "back-stage" support for the various sponsors and coordinating the core activities scheduled. With the involvement of Chevrolet as the Franchise sponsor, there were numerous activations that were put in place to enhance the game of cricket and to assist with aggressive bums on seats campaign. During the season we hosted two Momentum Cup matches, three Ram Slam T20 matches and three Sunfoil Series matches. There were also several Border Semi-Pro matches which were hosted at the stadium. The highlight on the cricket calendar was undoubtedly the One Day International between South Africa and the West Indies. The Windies did not perform as everyone had hoped for, but at least our home team, the Proteas team won the match in front of an almost sold out bumper crowd.

Fortunately rain was on our side this season and did not hamper any of our scheduled matches, however the dwindling of spectators at all stadiums continues to be an area of concern. The performance of the Warriors Team did not start exceptionally well this season, but the team fought hard in the Momentum Cup to narrowly miss out on the play-offs.

During the limited overs' matches, we had the Chevrolet vehicles driving around the field as well as the mobile dealership from sponsors Chevrolet. The mascot was present at all matches and the younger generation continue to enjoy our children's area with jumping castles. The Hudson Park Cheerleaders also entertained our crowds during intervals. Our access control at entrance gates worked for the first time since the Cricket World Cup 2003 and assisted us to determine our attendance figures. Our smallest crowd was 1095 in the last Momentum match of the season.

Other exciting and new innovations was the Schools T20 challenge which was contested between Hudson Park High School and Dale College, which was the curtain raiser to the Warriors and Knights match on Friday 27 November with 4 000 spectators. The turnout from the school pupils, parents and teachers was well supported and we hope to have more of these matches.

Our fundamental focus for the support and financial commitment was to ensure that we retained our existing stakeholders and with the international, we fortunately retained all our existing clients and welcomed a few new Companies to our stadium. Our PR activities included our quarterly newsletter, "Off the Bat", updating of our company website and facebook pages, next events boards, additional signage, and this our Annual Report, an exhibition at Hemingways Mall, regular Press releases and a special wrap with the Daily Dispatch. The staff also supported local charities for Tekkie Tax Day as well as Slipper Day and continue to send out special greetings for Secretaries Day, Easter, Christmas and other special holidays.

We also had our first ever Golf Day in March and congratulate Daily Dispatch on winning the 1st prize. Thanks also to Meyers Delta who were the main sponsor on the day. We also must thank all our participants and sponsors for the golf day who generously donated prizes and products.

Buffalo Park Hospitality has had another interesting and eventful year. New relations with both service providers and clients were created. The past financial year, though starting off promising did not meet our grand expectations and we fell short of meeting our sales target of **R4 788 000.00** for the 2014/15 Financial year. We are proud though of all efforts made by the team to generate revenue for Border Cricket, as per our mandate.

We set out the year with a lot of enthusiasm, with every effort to deliver the best service possible, get the Buffalo Park Hospitality known in the East London Market. Many days were spent brainstorming new ideas on how we can attract more customers and become more relevant in the market.

This report highlights our Sales for 2014/15, event and Function highlights, and our shortfall in the past year, as well as new prospects for the coming year.

Hospitality Highlights

The Department kicked its year off on a high pace, hosting the **Independent Electoral Commission** as Vote Capturing and Results centre during the election period. We hosted for the 2nd annual **Pick n Pay Woman's Cancer walk**, this was attended by close to **3000** woman who braved the winter chill to support this great cause.

In June the **Border Kei Chamber of Business** held the annual AGM, this is the 3rd year we have held this event in our Presidential Suite. **Transnet Freight Rail** also held their annual **EVP Launch** that hosted **300** of staff, who came to pledge their commitment to the year's target, a very exciting event. We are also so proud to have hosted **USSA-B week**.

We hosted the ever popular **Head Honcho lifestyle picnic** on the B-field. This picnic/ music festival with popular South African musicians such as AKA, DALES and KO and Young Reezy, drew a crowd of over **3000** young people to our B-Field.

Our most exciting event and challenging was hosting the first ever **End year Awards** for the **Amathole District Municipality**. We hosted a Day Gala Dinner with **1800** guests with a 3 course served meal and open Bar. This was the first of its kind at Buffalo Park, it stretched us completely as a team, but we pulled it off.

We again held the **Buyelekhaya Jazz Festival** for the 3rd year running. This year we saw the stadium filled with over **22 000** people all in an effort to enjoy the ever popular concert. Enjoy it some did, but the stadium capacity was exceeded and it soon became evident that the concert had become too big for even the largest stadium in East London. We look forward to seeing how we can minimise the risk in the 2015/16 financial year.

On the 31st December 2014 **Count Down Music Festival** held the first ever New Year's Eve Concert at Buffalo Park and East London. This drew close **10 000** people to the stadium on a rainy summer evening.

Sales 2014/2015

2014/15 financial year saw us for our highest target to date; **R4 788 000.00**. It was a tough year and we only managed to make sales of **R2 903 009.00**, **60%** of the intended sales. We however have shown **20% growth** from the 2013/14 financial year where sales were at **R2 314 336.00** at the end of the year.

Our main business continues to come from conferencing, this is daily business; but we are yet to consistently confirm large conferences that will increase per conference. Our conference package sales came to **R521 536.00**; **55%** of the intended budget. Catering sales came in at **R 1 353 279.00**, the highest income generator and also growth of **55%** from the 2013/14 Financial year. Facilities Hire brought in **R 857 784.00**; majority of these sales came from the two concerts held at the stadium in December of 2014. These continue to prove to yield the highest profit margins and these is why we continue to try and attract major concerts to the stadium. Beverages sales came in at **R 554 239.00** **33%** increase from previous financial year.

All in all there has been an increase in sales but more could be done to improve.

Marketing and Advertising

We are happy to announce that Buffalo Park Hospitality has a website of its own that has been strategically positioned the show me East London website which is viewed by 90 000-100 000 were month. We focused all marketing and advertising on Conferencing in the 2014/15 financial year, but our marketing strategy lacked in-depth research and implementation was let too late. This is something we aim to improve on in the new financial year. We aim to increase our market share by 20%, with focus on Conference Packages in the first quarter, advertising in various print media and street pole advertising. Direct sales to increase our foot prints in both public and private sectors; using a well-planned marketing strategy for the next three years.

Conclusion

Buffalo Park Hospitality would like thank all those who have supported us in the past year, whether it is through sponsorship of events or simply by choosing Buffalo Park for your conferences and functions.

We will continue to strive for excellence in all areas of what we do. There are no limits to what we can do when we stand together. Ours is to action and believe for what the mind can conceive we can definitely achieve.



The 2014/15 season was brought on with great excitement when the fixtures were announced by Cricket South Africa. Buffalo Park to host an International, South Africa versus West Indies. The planning and preparation started for the match as soon as the fixtures were announced. This was to be the highlight of the season. During the build up, there was great excitement and hype around the stadium and East London. Chris Gayle and Andre Russell had played for the Lions and Knights earlier in the season (at Buffalo Park) and had performed exceptionally well. All was sent for great entertainment for the International. Unfortunately on match day, nothing went according to plan. West Indies won the toss and elected to bat first. West Indies were very disappointing playing a shot a ball and scoring a meagre 122 all out within 33.4 over's at a run rate of 3.62 per over. South Africa then came in and scored 124 for 1 in 24.4 over's at a run rate of 5.02, with no pressure in scoring the total that the West Indies had set.

Franchise

Sunfoil Series

Our focus for the Sunfoil Series was to produce good cricket wickets for the longer version of the game. Saying this however, a lot of the time other elements (which are completely out of our control) can affect the playing conditions, which can make it very tricky. The Warriors played three Sunfoil matches at Buffalo Park. The first two matches we achieved what we had set out to achieve. Unfortunately the last match offered a little more than we would have liked, for the seamers. However, overall there was a good contest between bat and ball. The Warriors played three games at Buffalo Park, winning one, drawing one and losing one.

20/20 Series

Our main focus for this series was to produce entertainment for the spectators and good flat wickets for the teams. The Warriors played two 20/20 matches, winning one and losing one.

In the first game, the Warriors played the Lions and there was great hype around Chris Gayle. The Warriors won the toss and elected to bat first, scoring 144 for six from 20 over's at a run rate of 7.2 per over. When the Lions came in to bat, Chris Gayle entertained and scored 108 off just 55 balls. The Lions scored 150 without loss from 14.2 over's at a run rate of 10.5 per over.

In the second game, Warriors versus the Knights, the Warriors won the toss and elected to field first. The Knights scored 146 for four from 20 over's at a run rate of 7.3 per over, with Andre Russell scoring 57 not out from 31 balls and Rudi Seccombe scoring 48. The Warriors then chased the total down scoring 149 for two from 19.3 over's at a run rate of 7.64 per over.

50 Over Series

The Warriors played two 50 over matches at Buffalo Park, winning one and losing one. The first game, the Warriors played the Lions. The Lions won the toss and elected to bat first. The Lions scored 285 for four from 50 over's at a run rate of 5.7 per over. The Warriors then chased the total down, scoring 289 for eight in just 39.2 over's at a run rate of 7.34 per over.

In the second match, the Warriors played the Knights. The Knights won the toss and elected to bat first. The Knights scored 266 for six in 50 over's at a run rate of 5.32 per over. The Warriors then unfortunately only scored 219 all out within 46.2 over's at a run rate of 4.72 per over.

Border

Sunfoil Three Day Series

The focus for this series was for the wickets to offer a good contest between bat and ball. The challenge in preparing wickets for this series is not only the weather in preparation and cloud conditions (on match days) but also the time factor to try and get results. Border played three Sunfoil three day matches at Buffalo Park, winning two, drawing two (one due to rain) and losing one.

One Day Series

Border played four One Day matches at Buffalo Park, winning three matches and losing one. Our focus was to produce good flat one day wickets, which we did.

20/20 Series

Border only played one 20/20 match at Buffalo Park, against Easterns. Easterns won the toss and elected to bowl first. Border scored 138 for eight in 20 over's at a run rate of 6.9 per over. Easterns then managed only 96 all out, in 19.2 over's at a run rate of 4.96. Fojela bowled exceptionally well taking six for nine runs in 3.2 over's at a run rate of 2.7 per over.

Border played all their home matches at Buffalo Park. Our focus was to try and fit all our Border matches in at Buffalo Park and try and keep the standard of wickets the same as the Franchise matches.



Other Matches At Buffalo Park

We hosted the opening of the season at where schools U/13 played, clubs, women, Hudson Park and Selborne and Border versus the Warriors. Through the season we also hosted Border Women, schools, Buffs club (nine matches) , club T20 final as well as the USSA "B" week.

Overview of the Grounds Department

We had once again a very challenging, but rewarding season. Not only did we manage Buffalo Park but also oversaw and advised at Kei Cricket to get the facility to the required standard. We are now focused on maintain the standards that have been set at Khaya Majola Oval as well as completing all the projects that we have for Kei Cricket.

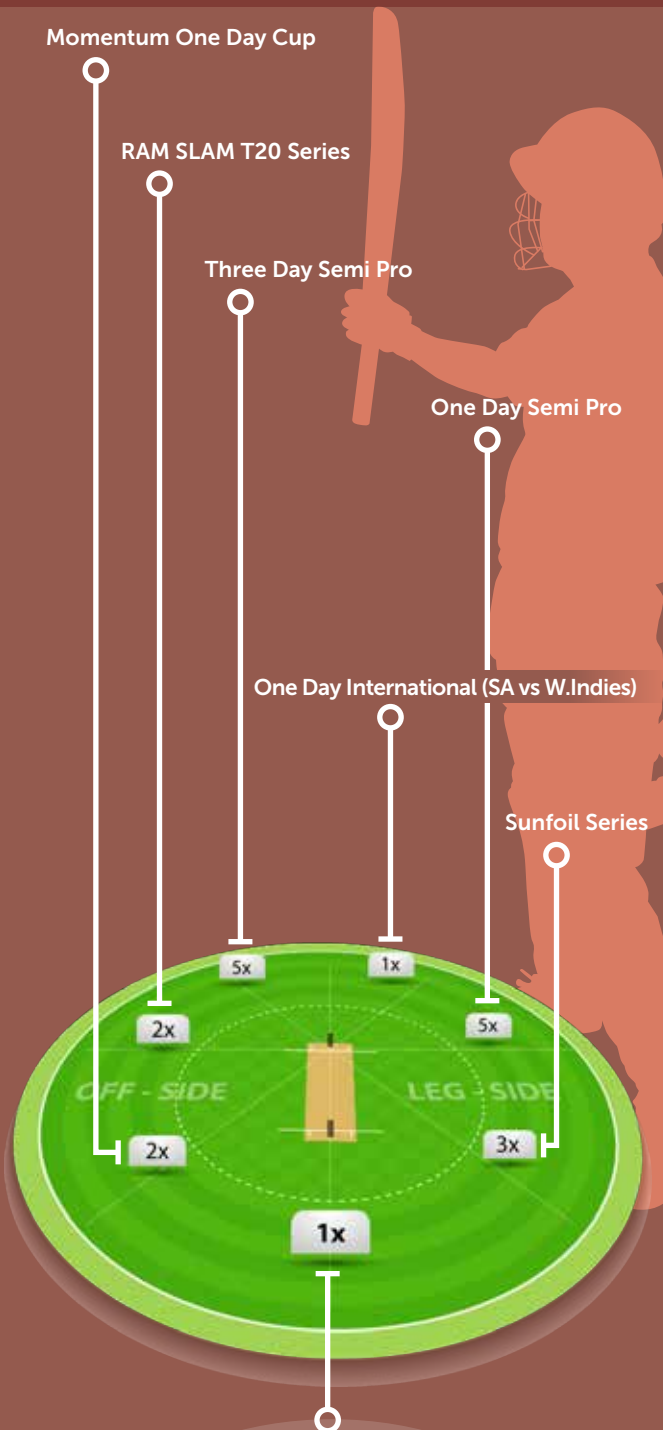

Three Day Challenge

We had a very average Three Day campaign. We played 10 matches of which we won two lost four and drew four. The first match was against EP in Port Elizabeth. Having dismissed EP for 153 runs in the first innings we managed to score 280 runs in our first innings. We had a lead of 127 runs on the first innings. In their second innings they scored 280 runs leaving us to score 154 to win the match. We batted poorly in our second innings and could only manage to score 97 runs. We lost the game by 57 runs.

Our second game against SWD was a rain affected game. SWD batted first and scored 258 runs all out. We were on 56 runs for 2 wickets when the rain interrupted the game. No further play was possible.

The next match against North West was also rain affected. North West scored 187 runs in their first innings. We replied with 197 runs. We had them in trouble at 60 for 3 when the rain came down.

We won our match against Griquas by 9 wickets. They scored 258 runs in the first innings. We replied with 491 for 9 declared. They scored 224 in the second innings, leaving us to score 66 for the win.

We were comprehensively beaten by Gauteng. They scored 359 for 8 declared. We replied with 193 all out and were asked to follow on. We scored 314 in the second innings leaving them to score 152 to win.

We beat Easterns by 7 wickets in our next match. We bowled them out for 114 in the first innings and replied by scoring 287 runs. We then dismissed them for 257 and knocked off the 85 required for the loss of 3 wickets.

We drew our match against KZN in Durban. They scored 154 in the first innings whereby we replied by scoring 226. In their second innings they scored 306 all out. We ended on 114 for 4 wickets when play was called off.

In our last match we were well beaten by a strong Northerns team. We scored 158 runs in the first innings. They replied by scoring 187. In our second innings we could only muster up a lowly 182 run leaving them to score 154 for victory. They managed that by scoring the 154 runs with no wickets down.

Our second last game was against Western Province in Cape Town. We lost the toss and were sent in to bat. We managed to score 262 in our first innings with S Seyibokwe scoring 101 runs. He was well supported by D Brown who scored 65 runs. They scored 374 all out in their first innings. Our best bowler was A Gqamane who picked up 4 wickets for 47 runs in 20 overs. In our second innings we managed to score 312 for the loss of 7 wickets when the two captains called the match.

The last game of the season was against Free State in Bloemfontein. Again we lost the toss and were sent in to bat on a wicket that had good grass cover. We were dismissed for a paltry 90 runs in our first innings. They scored 291 runs in their first innings giving them a lead of 201 on the first innings. In our second innings we managed to score 136 runs thus losing the match by an innings and 56 runs. We need to revisit our strategy for this competition if we want to win the competition.

One Day Challenge

We ended up winning this competition by beating Free State on their home ground in Bloemfontein. We played 7 games won 5 and lost 2. We beat SWD by Eight wickets in our first match. They scored 255 for 7 in their 50 overs. We replied with 256 for 2 in 44 overs. Martin Walters scored an unbeaten 102 runs and was well supported by Gionne Koopman who scored 87 not out. In the match against North West, we were put in to bat and scored 248 runs all out. They replied by scoring 249 for 5 in 48, 5 overs. We lost by 5 wickets. Our next match was against Griquas. They batted first and scored 182 for 8 wickets. We replied by scoring 190 for 6 wicket, beating them by 4 wickets. We were

convincingly beaten by KZN. We lost by 172 runs. We managed to beat Northerns by 4 wickets. They scored 257 for 9 wickets. After rain interrupted our innings the match was reduced to 42 overs. We had to score 227 to win. We reached our target with 6 wickets down, winning by 4 wickets. We needed to win our last match against WP with a Bonus point to qualify to play in the final against KZN Inland or Free State. We won the toss and sent them in to bat. We managed to restrict them to 191 all out in 49 overs. All our bowlers were excellent on the day. T Mnyaka ended up taking 4 wickets for 36 runs in his allotted 10 overs. The other bowler chipped in by each picking up 1 wicket. We had to chase down the target in 40 overs to secure the bonus point and qualify for the final. We got off to the worst start ever with Seyibokwe being run out with our total on 9. A 60 run partnership between De Wett and Walters put us back on track. We managed to win the game by 1 wicket reaching the target in 39.5 overs. We won the match with a bonus point thus qualifying for the final. In the final against Free State, we won the toss and sent them in to bat. Our bowlers were superb with Fojela and Mbane each picking up 4 wickets. We restricted them to 110 in 32 overs. We had to score 111 runs to win the match. We chased down their total with 5 wickets still remaining. It really was an excellent team performance in winning the cup. Every player contributed. Well done to the players.

T20 Competition

In this competition we played four games of which we won two and lost two. In our first Eastern Province we lost the toss and were asked to bowl first. We managed to restrict them to a reasonable total of 151 runs for the loss of 8 wickets in their allotted 20 overs. D Brown and T Mnyaka both picked up 3 wickets. In reply we ended up scoring 138 runs all out in 19.5 overs thus losing by 13 runs. Our second match was against Gauteng at the Wanderers. We won the toss and sent them in to bat. They scored 167 runs in their 20 overs. Y Cook was outstanding for them scoring his maiden hundred. In chasing we managed to score 144 runs with M Marais top scoring with 35 runs. We lost the match by 23 runs. In our third match against Easterns we registered our first win in this competition. After being put in to bat we managed to score a very competitive 138 runs for the loss of 8 wickets. Burton De Wett top scored with 46* and was well supported by A Sodumo who scored 33 runs. Our bowlers were outstanding in defending our total. P Fojela picked up a career best of 6 wickets for 9 runs in 3.2 overs. We managed to dismiss them for 96 runs, winning convincingly by 42 runs. In our last match against Free State we won a close encounter by beating them off the last ball of the match with 1 wicket remaining. We restricted them to 148 for 6 in 20 overs. We replied by scoring it in 20 overs with 9 wickets down. T Mnyaka top scored with a well played 34 runs before being run out. Looking at the results it is safe to say that we had a average campaign in this competition.

General Comments

Our season can be described as satisfactory even though we won the One Day cup. We could have been more competitive in the other competitions. We were disappointing in the three day competition after a good start. We experimented in the T20 competition and played a lot of young players. There is much room for improvement in this competition as well. We can be proud of our players in the manner they represented our province. They were real ambassadors on and off the field.

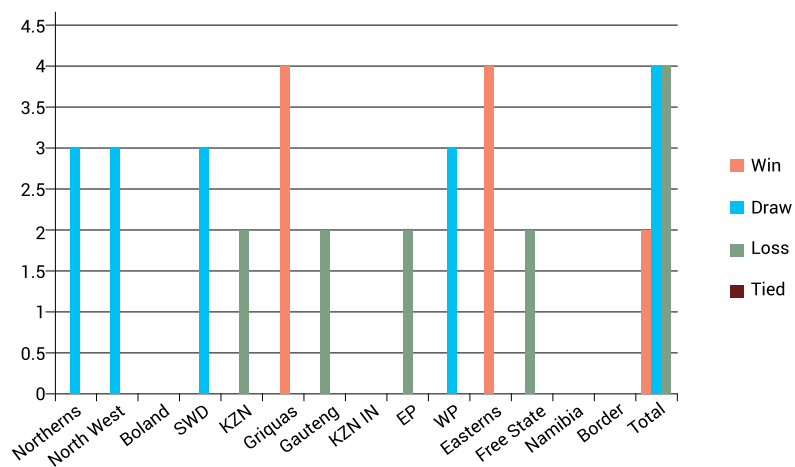

RURAL CRICKET MFUNDO MACANDA

During the period under review Border Rural Cricket (BRC) season was full enterprising activities as planned by the cricket leadership of different regions. This is reference to the different success and failures achieved in various activities that we embarked on. The rural cricket season has three major activities these are Rural Cricket South Africa (RCSA) fixture and week, Amacal'egusha Tournament and Ngumbela Tournament. It is during these activities that the talent embodied in rural communities is showcased, the players that do well in the two regional tournament get a chance to represent their regions in the RCSA competitions.

The RCSA competition form is the epitome of the countries rural cricket participation. The BRC in this competition is represented by three teams. These teams get selected from the Amacal'egusha Tournament (Border Villages) and Ngumbela Tournament (Border Aloes), Border Rural this selected from former district area of Border Cricket teams (King Williams Town, Middledrift, Alice, Healdtown, Queenstown, Stutterheim and Aliwal North). This season the selection of Rural team reached all the district as they were invited for trials and this proved to be the inspiration of the team. During the season the performance of all three teams were not always satisfactory due to different team problems that were sorted by regional leadership. There are two RCSA competitions, the first one is the fixture that started in October 2014 and finished in January 2015. This competition allows the teams to play in the Rural Week. The top 10 teams out of fifteen that participate went to the Rural week that was in Potchefstroom hosted by North West Cricket. It was for the first time in the history of these two completion that all three

of our teams qualify to go to the tournament. This was achieved with Border Rural team winning the Coastal Section Log. The performance of the teams in the week was very disappointing as they could only achieve four wins out of fifteen games played by these teams combined. The best performing team was Border Rural that won three games out of five, Border Villages won one and Border Aloes lost all the games. The season was wrapped well with the selection of four players and coach to RCSA team. The players are Avumile Mnci (Villages), Lwando Lwana, Mkhululi Calana and Loyiso Mdashe (all Rural); Mfuneko Ngam was selected as coach of RCSA team. Loyiso Mdashe could not take part in RCSA team due to call-up by Border Semi-Pro team.

The two rural regional tournaments took place as planned by the regional leadership. The tournaments were made possible by the generous sponsorship of Mr. AM Ngumbela and that of Department of Sport, Recreation, Arts and Culture (DSRAC). The sponsorship of Mr Ngumbela made sure that all teams participating in the two tournaments received prizes and catering for all the spectators in both finals is possible. On top of the prize money, balls and cricket bats were provided to each team participating in the two tournaments by Mr Ngumbela. For the first time DSRAC invested heavily in the two tournaments in Ngumbela Tournament they provided 12 buses that ferried cricket supporters from King Williams Town, Middledrift, villages of Alice and Healdtown.

In Amacal'egusha DSRAC supported the tournament with an amount of R60 000 that was used to catering and transportation of 11 teams that participated in the tournament. For Amacal'egusha Cricket Board Border Cricket provided 382 balls to play all union tournaments that took place from 26 to 31st December 2014. The support that was provided by Border Cricket is commendable as all agreed support was rendered by the office. This was only possible because communication between office and leadership improved significantly. This does not say everything was smooth sailing but great strides have been made in working together.

The BRC would like to extend the word of sincere gratitude to Mr. Ngumbela who in the challenging economic times still finds a way to support cricket in our region. In this season he went further to donate an electronic wheel chair to Zamuxolo Mawane of Abonwabisi Cricket Club from Pirie in King Williams Town.

All of the mentioned success of it will not have been possible without the dedicated leadership shown by the regional leadership, managers and coaches of all the teams. These individuals are leaving their personal issues to attend to cricket voluntarily. Congratulations are in order for Phaphama Fojela who moved from Rural Cricket to shine in the Semi-Pro cricket, this shows the quality and level of cricketers that are out there in rural areas.

SCHOOLS CRICKET

Introduction

This serves to inform the other Stakeholders of the developments, activities and challenges as faced by the schools' cricket committee during the afore - named season. We would also like to share our experiences, joy and humbleness when things went right for us as well as our disappointments when things turned sour.

Governance

The school committee [MANCO] works under the auspices of the Executive Committee, which ratifies any decisions/activities of MANCO. The entire Exco works under the guidance of the Schools' National Office as well as under the leadership of Border Cricket Board. The schools feed the Regions, which in turn feed the Province with players, human resources for cricket activities and other necessities.

Finances

The Schools' Committee does not handle any monies, recently, but has its paper budget with the amateur office. Therefore, we do not have any financial report to table.

Operations

We work with affiliated schools, sub - regions, regions, the province and the amateur office, Mr S. Sibaca, in particular. We operate by using the structures thus mentioned above.

Structure

We have an active schools committee which was elected in August 2014, which is comprised of the Chairman, Deputy Chairman, Treasurer, General Secretary, Dep. Secretary and Sub - Committee Heads [Additional Members].

Participation/Activities

We took part in almost all school activities such as regional meetings, MANCO & EXCO meeting, National Meetings, Border Cricket Board meetings and ceremonies/obituaries [funeral services of the departed people], "our" capping function fiasco, the T20 KFC Tournament, we revised our schools Constitution and adopted it, U12 Festival, National Weeks and preparations thereto and we are closing the gap between Mini - Cricket Structures and hard ball structures. It is work in progress!

The results of our participation in the field of play are a mixed bag. With more resources injected, our future looks promising.

Challenges

- Being sent from pillar to post when we needed to affiliate to Border Cricket by the office.
- Working without our budget
The "scanty" budget makes it a very difficult task to implement regional fixtures [inter - schools] coupled with long distances, at high fares, the rural schools have to travel to play cricket.
- Ageing / old Educators who are over-worked and underworked in previously and currently disadvantaged schools.
- Insufficient or misleading communication from the amateur office.
- Lack of clear organogram of the structure/s of the mother body or lack of information regarding this from us.
- Unconvincing clarity about how schools are expected to fare well, particularly in rural areas, without / meagre resources.
- Non-existence of people with disabilities committees, at least at provincial level.
- Lack or shortage of lower ages female cricket players/ establishment of their team structures at school, regional and provincial levels.

Solutions

The solutions to our challenges is to reverse the challenges and cease to assume that one size fits all, pay lip service on matters that affect rural communities and try to work honestly as people of one united country.

Conclusion

Due to time and space constraints, we could not furnish you with pictures and details of some of our activities.

MIDDLEDRIFT CRICKET BOARD

KWANELE TSHAPU

Introduction

Middledrift Cricket Board is made up 26 teams from the surrounding villages. The Board has its headquarters at Wilton Mkwayi Cricket ground in Middledrift. It is dependent on the affiliation fees from these teams, although not all of them do pay subscriptions. We were also depending on the grant from Border Cricket to be able to do some maintenance work on our facility but it is no longer forthcoming due to the previous executive not accounting for the August 2012 payment. Middledrift is abuzz with talent especially at junior levels. We have a number of youths who year in year out form part of the border schools teams.

General

Middledrift cricket experienced a bit of a tough time the past season with all of our home games being played away from home. This was because our field (Wilton Mkwayi) was not in a good state to host cricket games. This was due to the fact that the groundsman had stopped working because he was not getting his salary as Middledrift was no longer getting its grant from Border Cricket due to the previous administrators to accounting for the grant usage.

Towards the end of the season we managed to get the grant and spoken with the groundsman to come and work on the field so that when the upcoming season arrives the field can be in a right state. The work is in progress to have the field ready.

The Middledrift team that participates in the promotional league of the Border club cricket structure did well in finishing 3rd in the log last season.

Middledrift has a serious challenge of infrastructure, this limits some of our teams from performing to their best as they sometimes lose their good players to those teams that have infrastructure.

Internal league

Our internal league started on the 08/11/2014. We grouped our teams according to where they are located in order to minimise travelling costs to games. Still we experienced problems as some teams could not fulfil all their fixtures citing financial constraints. We struggled with balls as Border Cricket failed to supply us with balls though we did submit our fixtures to them. We are grateful to our three (3) unions for supplying balls so that the games can go ahead.

When the group stages were finished the teams played cross group knockout games to determine the eventual champions. Fight Again cricket club from Zihlahleni location were crowned internal league champions with Debe Marela Cricket Club from Debe Marela location as their runners up.

Amacal'egusha Tournaments

From the 26th of December all our three (3) unions viz. Amagqunukhwebe, Thanduxolo and Vukani had their Amacal'egusha tournaments.

Amagqunukhwebe Cricket Union held their tournament at Banzi location and their eventual champions were Morning Stars from Njwaxa location.

Thanduxolo Cricket Union held theirs at Qibirha location. This union could not crown their champions. Here they group their teams into two groups with the top teams from each group contesting the final. This time around they introduced a new ruling with the top two teams from each group going on to the semi-finals. Which were to be played cross pull. The teams that finished top of each group refused to play the semi-finals saying they should be contesting the final. This resulted to the tournament being called off.

Vukani Cricket Union held theirs at Thorn Park location and Rock of Ages from Mfiki location was crowned champions.

Women's Cricket

The past season so the re-introduction of women's cricket in the Border region, Middledrift women's team participated in this league and they finished 3rd overall.

School's cricket

Currently there are 10 High schools and 4 primary schools that are active. They play the fixture on a home and away bases. From within these schools Lukholo Gwangqa went on to represent Border in the Coca Cola cricket week.

This past season Middledrift had no fewer than 10 school boys selected for the various provincial age groups though some of the boys are studying in schools outside Middledrift.

The 2014/2015 season started towards the end of October and finished in the middle of March. During the season we have embarked on various activities and a lot has been accomplished by Healdtown cricket and there were some challenges that the club also faced. This report will basically detail the progress made Healdtown cricket board in this season also recommend issues that we certainly believe that could help and benefit the development of sport in particular cricket in this area. It is also important to note that Healdtown cricket board has 12 clubs affiliated to it however Border cricket always like to refer to it as a club.

Activities

During the season Healdtown cricket has been involved in a number of activities which including annual tournaments that are played by clubs playing under the auspices of Healdtown cricket board. These tournaments are sponsored by local business people and they are always played during the festive season and their main purpose is to provide entertainment to young and old during this time of the year. These tournaments are the Ngumbela cricket development tournament and the Ray Mali T20 challenge. Healdtown cricket was participated in the Nkonkobe Municipality mayors cup which is contested between Healdtown, Alice and Middledrift.

On the 28th of October together with Border cricket, Healdtown cricket successfully hosted the Women's cricket roadshow and talent identification where a number of young girls of various age groups were identified and given an opportunity to showcase their talents and compete among the best in the Border region. The selected girls went on to be trialed at Buffalo Park which two were selected in the u/19 provincial team

On the 11th to the 18th Healdtown cricket hosted a CSA level one coaching course for all the young and aspiring coaches in the area. A total of 15 coaches took part in this course which was conducted by Mr Raymond Booie from Border cricket. These coaches have since obtained their level one coaching qualification and are now helping with coaching the surrounding schools and also in their respective local clubs.

During the December/January months two tournaments were played and the first tournament which was the Ray Mali t20 challenge and the Ngumbela cricket development tournament.

Ray Mali T20 challenge

This is a tournament sponsored by the Mali family in honor of the legendary and the former ICC president Mr Ray Mali. This tournament is organized by Healdtown cricket and it included top 4 teams from Alice. The tournament started on the 12th of December and it was played on a knockout format with the winners pocketing a sum of R25 000 and the player of the series getting a sum of R5000 and R10 000 bursary which is meant to help that individual to acquire any skill they wish acquire. The final of this tournament was between to clubs from Healdtown cricket namely Lamyeni Hard catch c.c and Jack hammer c.c which the latter took the honors of being crowned the champions.

Ngumbela cricket development tournament

This is an annual tournament hosted by Healdtown cricket and it is sponsored by Mr A.M Ngumbela a local businessman and a cricket lover. The tournament started on the 17th of December and it was contested by the 9 clubs affiliated to the board. The Healdtown final was contested by Fear Not CC and Lamyeni Hard Catch CC the winners were Lamyeni hard catch which went on to meet the Alice cricket board winners in the champ of champs final.

Achievements

The 2014/2015 season ended at mid-march and Healdtown cricket embarked on a number of programmes and lot has been achieved by Healdtown cricket board. Among the things that can be mentioned in this report is the successful hosting and administrating the two tournaments mentioned above in the report, Healdtown cricket first team reaching the finals of the Nkonkobe Municipality mayors cup which unfortunately could not be played against Middledrift due to bad weather and players being selected in the Border Aloes provincial team which went to play in Boland.

In this year CSA Rural Cricket Week held in Potchesfroom, Healdtown cricket had a total of 9 players and a coach representing the Border Aloes team. During this period the club has also successfully trained aspiring coaches, scorers and administrators through course held in conjunction with Border cricket and DSRAC.

We have also seen the formation of the HUB under the leadership of our president Mr Sigila, this structure will oversee the day to day running of all cricket affairs relating to the Centre of Excellence as per CSA requirements. The structure also includes the local schools, clubs and women cricket of all levels.

League results (Border Cricket)

Healdtown is an affiliate of Border cricket and has two teams playing in the Border leagues. The two teams representing Healdtown cricket did reasonably well in the leagues. The first team is playing in the Promotional League finished as runners up in the log standings with only 2 loses in the league.

The reserve side finished fifth in the log standings. The ladies team finished second in their regional league. This was a wonderful achievement considering that this team was only established in September.

Internal league

Our internal league consists of 12 clubs and this season the internal league did not run in the manner it was supposed to. This due to lack of commitment of the clubs and also the soccer league which sometimes uses the same fields being used by our local clubs. Border cricket did not supply us with match after having sent our internal league fixtures to club cricket administration as requested.

Challenges

Each season has its challenges that this club experience and this season was also no different. The biggest challenge that Healdtown cricket continue to experience is the transporting players to the games. The club struggle with funds and this has led to the reserve team missing one of its games which meant that the first team was docked some points. The delay of our club grants from Border cricket proved to be the biggest challenge that we faced during this season, this resulted in the club incurring a lot of debt from our transport service provider and also struggled with the maintenance of our home ground Ngumbela Park. The communication that is not up to standard between the club cricket officials and the clubs is still an issue that needs to be attended to.

None co-operation by the previous Healdtown cricket executive was also one of the challenges faced during this season, this resulted in a lot of infighting within the club and the owners and directors of the Ngumbela cricket development and Ngumbela park management. Lack of club sponsor is still a huge challenge for the club.

Recommendations

We as Healdtown cricket would like to categorically state that we honestly and sincerely appreciate the assistance we have so far received from the Department of Sport, Recreation, Arts and Culture which came in the form of playing and office equipment.

We would also like to recommend that the department also try to assist in funding the transport costs be it they pay half of the fee and club pays another fee. We would also like to recommend that club grants be paid on time as to curb clubs without official sponsors incurring debt from their service providers.

That Border cricket help clubs in need in terms of sourcing and recommending potential sponsors. That Border Cricket arrange more of the courses which are aimed to help the club administrators and the volunteer coaches.
